

While at Southwest Center, he wrote a curriculum on the process of getting into college and the difficulties you might encounter. MONDAY MORNING

The Choice is Yours: Pick the Path of Purpose

The purpose of this workshop is to explore the seven sacred teachings along with the four sacred medicines to better understand how one's choices ultimately impact their personal path. Teachers can use the information to discuss individual integrity and character building from a diverse vantage point, which promotes cultural awareness and sensitivity. Get in touch with traditional Native beliefs and identify the spirit helpers who are with you on your journey. Invite them to walk with you and play an active role in your journey. It's time to put your purpose into practice and the choice is yours! Participants will come away with methods to incorporate these teachings into their own curriculum to support cultural awareness and diversity.

Session attendees will:

- Explore the teachings of the great spirits and how they might apply to your life.
- Decide how you will take an active role in your personal success.
- Learn to live your life with integrity and purpose.

Presenter(s):

Everett LaFromboise is a Native American Anishinabe who lives in Cloquet, MN and follows the traditional teachings. Everett participates in countless ceremonies including Sweat Lodge, Sundance and tribal conferences. He is a strong believer in the gathering of healers. Everett shares a message that will alter your perspective and shift you from surviving to thriving.

Student Agency and Personalized Learning: Student Panel

Hear from high school students as they discuss in a panel forum, "how might teachers and school leaders foster a culture of student agency to drive personalized learning?"

Session attendees will:

- Gain a student perspective on the direction of education reform in our region.
- Consider the relationship between personalized learning and student agency.

Presenter(s):

Panel is comprised of high school students from San Juan BOCES member districts. Facilitated by Kelly Ratliff, Regional Literacy Support Specialist, San Juan BOCES.

Teach and Retire Rich

Learn how to maximize retirement savings options to secure the best possible financial future.

Session attendees will:

- Gain an understanding of the retirement savings plans available to teachers, and how to maximize them.
- · Understand the impact of fees on savings.

Presenter(s):

Daniel Otter is the owner of 403bwise.com, a nationally recognized website dedicated to 403(b) education and advocacy. In 2012, Money Magazine named him a "Money Hero" for his "Extraordinary efforts to improve others' financial well-being." He has discussed 403(b) and teacher retirement plan issues with school employees nationwide, at financial conferences, and on NPR. Dan, who has taught college, high school, middle school and elementary school, is the author of two books: *Teach and Retire Rich*, and *Financial Literacy for the Young (and the Young at Heart)*. He co-hosts the Teach and Retire Rich podcast with planner Scott Dauenhauer, CFP, which is available through iTunes and Libsyn.





MONDAY MORNING

Teachers who Write and Writers who Teach

This session will introduce participants to the key elements of the National Writing Project in order to generate interest in the new Bisti Writing Project Outpost Site in our region. The session structure will model many of the key elements of the National Writing Project, which include: reading and critical reflection; writing and sharing writing; sharing teacher expertise; and leadership/advocacy. The session will tackle questions of how we, as teachers, write and what that means for our teaching of writing. Participants will be given an opportunity to write and share their writing, as well as to generate strategies for what works in teaching writing.

Session attendees will:

- Experience how the NWP can contribute to their development as writers and teachers.
- Gather teacher-generated strategies that work for teaching writing in K-12 classrooms.

Presenter(s):

Dr. Suzanne Null has a doctorate in Curriculum and Instruction with a focus in Composition Theory from U.C. Santa Barbara, and a teaching credential and Masters in Creative Writing degree from CU-Boulder. She began her career by serving as the Backpacking Specialist at the Girl Scouts' Camp Mountain Meadows, and then worked in Boulder Valley School District as a secondary Language Arts teacher at Broomfield Heights Middle School and at Monarch High School. She has also helped coordinate the South Coast Writing Project's Young Writer's Camp, coordinated the 2008 Writing Research without Borders Conference, and helped edit two volumes on international writing research. Her research interests include writing instruction within school organizations; she is particularly interested in examining how other professions and organizations can inform the teaching profession, and how teachers' professional knowledge can inform those in other professions and organizations. Dr. Null is currently on the leadership committee of the Bisti Writing Project, and teaches K-12 literacy courses in Fort Lewis College's Teacher Education Department.

Michelle Bonanno began teaching composition in the Writing Program at Fort Lewis College in 2005 and currently teaches freshman- and sophomore-level writing and research courses as well as courses in the John F. Reed Honors Program. In addition to her teaching, Michelle also supervises Fort Lewis' campus-wide peer mentoring program and the College's Writing Center. Her research interests include: writing for community change, visual rhetoric, community-based research, and teaching for transfer. She earned a Masters in Communication from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas and an undergraduate degree in Psychology from Fort Lewis College.

Lorien Chambers Schuldt is an assistant professor in the Department of Teacher Education at Fort Lewis College. She holds a doctorate from Stanford University in Curriculum and Teacher Education. She joined the college in 2014 and teaches classes in classroom literacy instruction and language development. Lorien's research focuses on fostering rich literacy instruction in classrooms, particularly for culturally and linguistically diverse students. Prior to joining the faculty at Fort Lewis College, Chambers Schuldt was a doctoral student instructor at Stanford University and an elementary school teacher in California and Colorado for almost ten years. She also spent time in Mexico and New Zealand exploring family and teacher expectations in indigenous communities, and ways schools can support literacy development for emergent bilinguals.

MONDAY AFTERNOON

Brief Suicide Intervention Training: Techniques to Intervene and Support Students

This session will explore the barriers that make it difficult to talk about suicide with an individual or within a community. We will explore these barriers and how to overcome them. In this session, you will learn about risks for suicide and basic techniques for how to talk to students about suicide and intervene when you are concerned about a student. We will also explore strategies for supporting students after a suicide occurs within the community.





MONDAY AFTERNOON

Session attendees will:

- · Learn about risk factors for suicide.
- Learn techniques to intervene if they are concerned about suicide risk.

Presenter(s):

Megan Wrona, Ph.D. is a faculty member in the Psychology Department at Fort Lewis College. She is a licensed psychologist in both Colorado and Utah and has worked extensively with children, adolescents, and families in a range of clinical settings, including inpatient and day treatment where she worked closely with children and adolescents after suicide attempts.

Instructional Read Alouds

This session will give participants the opportunity to look closely at the use of Read Alouds to inspire, instruct, and inform. This format for the instructional read aloud encompasses the work of Lester Laminack, Norman Webb, Doug Fisher and Nancy Frey. The goal of this session is to provide attendees with a structure that will ensure that Read Aloud time is a highly valuable and instructional opportunity for students. The materials utilized for this session have been prepared by the Three Rivers Education Foundation. Each set includes 28 books and the instructional guide.

Session attendees will:

- Explore a structure to enhance instructional time via Read Alouds.
- Analyze the correlation between Close Reading and Depth of Knowledge.
- Investigate Lester Laminack's work regarding Read Aloud.

Presenter(s):

Bobbie Zemanek-White has 28 years of experience in public education having served as a teacher, instructional specialist, vice principal, and principal. For the past 7 years she has worked at the Three Rivers Education Foundation where she currently serves as the Curriculum Coordinator and Professional Development Facilitator.

Pat Martinez-Lopez has over 30 years of experience in public education having served as a special education teacher and special education director. She currently serves as a Regional Coordinator for the Three Rivers Literacy Initiative and provides a variety of professional development opportunities for the districts served by Three Rivers.

Preparing Native American Students for Post-Secondary Success

AIMS Collective Impact Initiative: First-Year Results and Lessons Learned

National research shows that Native American students graduate from high school unprepared for postsecondary life, and there is a significant college enrollment and persistence gap between Native American students in Southwest Colorado and their peers. These factors translate into a dramatic underrepresentation of Native Americans in postsecondary education and the workforce. The AIMS initiative, funded by a grant from Colorado Department of Higher Education, partners with three school districts, regional tribes, post-secondary institutions, Legacy Schools, business and community members to support Native American student success. AIMS is guided by a Leadership Team of partners and employs four strategies, which can be replicated by any school to support minority student success. The first year results are promising, with increased representation of Native students in advanced placement and concurrent enrollment courses, and planning to attend post-secondary institutions.

Session attendees will:

- Understand the four strategies used by the AIMS initiative to support Native student success.
- Learn how to guide a focused, goal drive action team process to achieve results.

Presenter(s):

AIMS Action Team Members from M-CHS, SWOS, DHS, Animas and IHS

Facilitated by **Mary Rubadeau**, the coordinator for the AIMS Collective Impact Grant. An educator in Southwest Colorado for the past seventeen years, she has served as Superintendent in Telluride and Executive Director of the San Juan BOCES.





MONDAY AFTERNOON

Questioning with Rigor and Relevance

Participants will explore two tools used to examine the levels of rigor and relevancy of curriculum, instruction, and assessments. The two tools we will explore are the Rigor/Relevant Framework and the Depth of Knowledge (DOK) wheel.

Session attendees will:

- Use 'word-splash' to understand and visually display vocabulary.
- Collaborate with peers to develop rigorous and relevant instruction.

Presenter(s):

Wendy Hunt - I am an educator of 12 years+ in the Central Consolidated School District. I have been a substitute teacher, special education teacher, and now a regular elementary education teacher (6th grade) in Kirtland, New Mexico.

R, an Open Source Tool to Make Data Real with Students

Participants will be introduced to R, a program that will allow students to analyze data by constructing bar charts, histograms, line charts, box plots, scatter plots and regression. R can be used to demonstrate variability, forms of distributions, recognize outliers, and sampling patterns. Third through fifth graders can see examples generated by R, while upper grade students can perform hands on analysis.

Session attendees will:

- Use R to perform tasks required by Colorado standards in data analysis, statistics, and probability.
- Gain insight into the use of R for science, math, social studies, agricultural, and other classes.
- Learn the benefits of using R to analyze large relevant data sets.

Presenter(s):

Jack Schuenemeyer is President of Southwest Statistical Consulting and professor emeritus, University of Delaware. His interests include data analysis, statistical modeling, graphics and statistical computing with applications in energy, environment and earth science. His passion is working with students. He is President of Cortez Montezuma School District board and the San Juan BOCES board.

Brittany Lang is currently an 8th grade science teacher at CMS. She has taught in the district for five years. Her passion is creating lasting relationships with her students while empowering them to critically think about the world in which we live. She believes that interdisciplinary, hands-on, experiential learning creates the greatest impact in their educational careers. She hopes with such skills, her students will leave a positive legacy in the communities they serve.

Reality Store

This simulation activity promotes career awareness and informs students as to the decisions which await them as adults. High school students identify careers and family life choices while developing a monthly budget they will use to shop for goods such as housing, groceries, child care etc. The goal is to survive one month in the adult world without going bankrupt.

Session attendees will:

- Have a chance to experience the Reality Store with samples from the program.
- Walk away with the tools you will need to host your very own Reality Store.

Presenter(s):

Amy Miglinas - I graduated from Western Michigan University with a Bachelor's in Career & Technical Education and for 9 years worked with young and transitioning adults in private industry. I earned my Masters from Adams State University in School Counseling with a passion for guiding students towards career success. I have been a school counselor for 9 years with the Bayfield School District; the past 5 focusing on post-secondary readiness for Bayfield High School.





TUESDAY MORNING

Classroom Management Strategies

Learn 101 things to "say and do" during difficult classroom interactions. Maintain your personal integrity through effective communication strategies that really work. Participants will learn step by step responses to transform difficult conversations. Multiple techniques will be discussed to ensure you can find your voice, maintain wholeness and go unimpaired while engaging others during difficult interactions.

Session attendees will:

- Learn to use assertive communication as a fair and reasonable response
- Make use of effective assertion models 101 things to say and do during difficult interactions
- Identify the imbalance of passive, aggressive and passive/aggressive communication

Presenter(s):

Jody Janati, trainer, speaker, conference facilitator. Jody has an Ed.D. degree in Organizational Leadership, and a M.A. degree in Speech Communication. She currently teaches in the Communication Studies Department at the University of Minnesota. She offers a variety of public and professional workshops on conflict reduction tactics and effective communication skills throughout the year. During her academic career she has held a number of administrative positions in higher education, taught for the MN state prison system and worked for various colleges throughout Minnesota. She is also the author of five books.

Cultural and Linguistic Responsiveness in Schools

Come join the conversation about culturally and linguistically diverse (CLD) learners! This session will talk about who these students are, how best to assess their needs in an appropriate way, and design interventions to support these unique learners within our schools.

Session attendees will:

- Gain knowledge about Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CLD) learners
- Gain awareness of the implications of standardized measures on CLD learners
- Have the skills and materials to share this information with their teams and schools in the future

Presenter(s):

Raleigh Marmorstein is a School Psychologist for the San Juan BOCES, serving Montezuma-Cortez and Dolores school districts. Raleigh originally hails from Michigan, though she's found herself at home in the mountains of Colorado. Raleigh's professional interests include early childhood, language and the brain, and cultural responsiveness for all students. #Don't Forget to be Awesome!

The Destination Myth

The Destination Myth is the belief that happiness is found in the destinations of life- in external rewards and accomplishments. This belief underlies much of the depression, anxiety and self-esteem issues that our young people experience. When we teach and model for our kids that achievement is more important than the process, they often lose the love of learning. Learn ways to show kids that their self-worth is based on who they are, and not what they accomplish.

Session attendees will:

- Learn ways to focus more on the process of learning and less on the outcomes of academia.
- Learn the importance of social and emotional learning.

Presenter(s):

Nicholas D. Thompson - While I have a private practice in Boulder, Colorado, I am also employed as a Mental Health Interventionist for the St. Vrain Valley School District. Additional experience includes serving as lead parent facilitator for iTHRIVE, an early substance abuse intervention program for teens and their parents, as well as facilitating trainings on adolescent development for school districts, professional conferences, middle and high school students, and parents.

Google Overlook

This session will explore Google Forms and how we can use this simple tool in a variety of ways throughout the educational environment. Collect information, monitor progress, automate quizzes and more with this amazing program.

Session attendees will:

- Learn how to build a form and manage the data it collects.
- Explore add-ons that take forms to another level.

Move It! Move It! (In The Classroom)

Integrating movement breaks in the classroom is one of the four ways to increase physical activity throughout the school day. The brain thrives on physical activity. This session will give you a taste of why and how to incorporate physical activity breaks into your classroom. You will learn the essential components to successfully transform your classroom into a brain friendly environment.

Session attendees will:

- Learn why the brain needs physical activity breaks to optimize retention of information.
- Participate in activities that can be taken back to the classroom

Presenter(s):

Cindy Erickson has over 30 years experience teaching physical activity to children and adults. She holds a Master's of Science in exercise physiology and Masters of Education in physical education and health. Cindy has worked with several school districts and the state level to improve physical education curriculum and programs. She has a passion for educating individuals and groups about the benefits of physical activity on the brain and body.

Weeding is an Academic Subject! Education in the Garden

Garden educators Erin Bohm and Taylor Henzler will bring science, math and health standards to life with a hands-on demonstration of garden education in Ft. Lewis's Environmental Center garden.

Session attendees will:

- Connect classroom topics to what is happening in the school garden, with a focus on the science of drought resiliency.
- Promote student buy-in and positive behavior management in an outdoor setting.
- Feel comfortable and at ease teaching in the outdoor classroom/garden.

Presenter(s):

Erin Bohm - From the arctic circle to New Zealand's southern island, Erin Bohm has been teaching in outdoor classrooms since 1996. 




MAP
